Mark Wilson

This month features Mark Wilson.

James Mark Wilson, known professionally as Mark Wilson,

began his interest in magic when he was eight years old and saw a magician named Tommy Martin perform at a hotel in Indianapolis, where the Wilson family were staying at the time.

Later, as a teenager, he became a clerk and demonstrator at Douglas Magicland in Dalas Texas, and started performing at small functions.

Studying Marketing in college was an important part of his later career.

As television started to grow, he created a local show entitled "Time for Magic" in 1955. Using his marketing training, he got Dr. Pepper to sponsor the show. He then expanded the show from Dallas, to include Houston and San Antonio.

In 1960, when videotape was developed, Wilson created

the first show to be videotaped and nationally syndicated. The original black and white "Magic Land of Allakazam." Every Saturday morning, Kids tuned in to see Magic, performed on television.

His wife, Nani Darnell, assisted him and they were joined by Bev Bergeron, who helped write the shows and played the character Rebo the Clown. At this time, Kellogs sponsored the show.

The three toured State fairs during the summer, and made appearances on other network TV shows.

For the first year of 39 shows, Carl Owen building the illusions, then a young John Gaughan took over the illusion building on the second year. This group was the nucleus that brought a new look to magic illusions that are still being used today.

The show followed a formula which Wilson devised and which he believed was essential for the success of magic on television—there should be a live audience, there should not be a cut from one view to another during a trick, and viewers should know that they were seeing exactly what the studio audience saw.

Mark Wilson is widely credited as the first major television magician, and in the process established the viability of illusion shows as a television format.

Penn & Teller said: "Prior to Wilson, magic on TV was limited to short spots on shows like Ed Sullivan's. Wilson pioneered the idea that there was a wide audience for a television series based on magic."

Countless Magicians have been inspired to take up Magic, by watching Mark Wilson on TV.

Later in his career, Mark Wilson performed all over the world with his wife and their sons, Greg and Mike. Wilson also taught celebrities like Cary Grant, Bill Bixby and Johnny Carson how to employ magic in their work, and produced Magic effects for films, TV productions,


commercials, amusement parks and live attractions.

In 1975, he published his Mark Wilson's Complete Course In Magic, which is still in production in various forms around the world.

A founding member of the Magic Castle in Hollywood, Mark Wilson has twice won Magician of the Year and the Masters Fellowship from The Academy of Magical Arts Magic Castle; the prestigious David Devant Award from England's Magic Circle; named Superstar of Magic by the International Brotherhood of Magicians; elected to The Society of American Magicians Hall of Fame; and received countless additional honors.

In a twelve-month survey readers of MAGIC Magazine named Mark Wilson one of the ten most influential American magicians of the 20th century, along with Houdini, Thurston, Copperfield, Blackstone, Henning, Siegfried and Roy, Tarbell, Cardini and Dai Vernon.

Mark Wilson died at age 91, in 2021. In his lifetime he had an enormous impact on the world of Magic!

Staying Humble

This week I want to explore what magicians can learn from some of history's most famous figures.

One of the early thought leaders in Quantum Physics was Albert Einstein.

Albert Einstein (1879–1955) was a German-born theoretical physicist renowned for revolutionizing science with his theory of relativity, encapsulated in the famous equation E=mc².

For those of you who don't have a physics degree, E is Energy, m is the mass of the energy and c is the speed of light. Given that the speed of light is 186,000 miles per second, when that number is squared it becomes a huge number of 34,596,000,000. This helped him win some coveted honors.

His work reshaped our understanding of space, time, and energy, earning him the 1921 Nobel Prize in Physics for his explanation of the photoelectric effect.

A symbol of intellectual genius, Einstein was also a humanitarian and advocate for peace, often speaking out against war and racism.

Here are three lessons for magicians I took away from his life and legacy...

Embrace Curiosity:

Einstein's insatiable curiosity led him to question the universe's deepest mysteries.

We've always believed that curiosity is one of the greatest qualities any top magician can have.

In a more basic example, it's curiosity that most often leads us to purchase new magic (so we know all of you on this list have that quality).

Using that same energy we can continuously use our curiosity to explore new concepts, techniques, and ways to engage audiences.

Persistence Pays Off:

Einstein spent years refining his ideas despite setbacks.

We'll never forget when we asked Andi Gladwin what the most important thing any magician could do, and he basically just said practice.

It is shocking how many magicians don't practice, when that's literally the most important thing we can do to be able to perform.

Not just practice in terms of being alone in our rooms working on a double lift, but also getting out there and getting real life experience.

Your persistence will pay off!

Stay Humble and Playful:

Despite his genius, Einstein

remained humble and had a playful sense of humor.

Magicians need to maintain this same sense of humility so we too can experience on a regular basis a sense of wonder. When we do this our audiences will feel that, and it keeps our art fun and accessible.

Don't be afraid to get in touch with the side of you that started enjoying magic in the first place.
